

Great Bardfield Parish Council report

Neighbourhood Plan

The draft Neighbourhood Plan is now ready to be reviewed and we will be consulting on the proposed content in June/July. Prior to its acceptance as an integral part of the local planning process we are required to obtain residents' feedback on the Plan.

A Drop-in Session will be held at the Town Hall, 10am – 4pm on Saturday June 15th where you can view excerpts of the Plan (or the whole thing) and discuss it with members of the Neighbourhood Plan team (volunteers from Great Bardfield) and our planning consultant. The Plan will also be available to view in The Community Information Point (CIP) and at Between The Lines Bookshop during the consultation period which runs for 6 weeks from 15th June. You will also receive an invitation to respond formally using our online or paper questionnaire.

Please take time to consider our plans and aspirations for the community of Great Bardfield including conserving what we have and having some control of future development of the village.

Planning Applications

- Black Gables, Dunmow Road: The final works to garden levels as required by the Inspector following an enforcement notice by Braintree District Council in 2023 are required to be completed by mid-May. Failure to do so may result in a further enforcement notice.
- Great Pitley Farm: notification of a non-material amendment to re-site the proposed new dwelling.

Playingfields/Pavilion Project

The Pavilion Project is now nearing completion with minor internal works to be completed over the next two months. We are now obtaining quotes to lay the extended carpark which will provide additional spaces behind the building and will include disabled parking. This is an additional expensive, but necessary, aspect of the project which will be funded partly by residents' donations. We thank all those that have given generously to this project. We are still seeking further funding, so if you are able to make a donation, please contact Kate Fox, the Parish Clerk, on 810111 or by email at clerk@greatbardfield-pc.gov.uk

Community Garden Project

Work to improve the Quiet Space and create a Community Garden has had

to be put on hold, temporarily, due to the waterlogged ground – much rain and more springs springing up. The PC and the Community Garden team are considering what can be done to drain water from this area to make it more usable.

Bus Service 9/9A

You may have seen recent news items about the removal of a number of bus services in our area. It seems that this includes the 9/9A to/from Braintree. Though the Parish Council have had no formal notification of the withdrawal of this service from the bus company or Essex County Council, we understand this will happen at the end of July 2024 and will be replaced by the 'DigiGo' service whereby transport must be booked in advance. The Parish Council do not agree with this erosion of our bus services and have been campaigning for improved levels of service on the current bus routes plus additional routes to link us with Dunmow, Saffron Walden etc. We recognise that the 9/9A service to Braintree is vital for the independence of many of our residents, including those that need it to attend work, school/college, medical and other appointments. It is one of only 2 forms of public transport available to residents of Great Bardfield and the surrounding villages.

Many residents have informed us about how this will impact on them and the Parish Council have written to Cllr Louise McKinlay, Deputy Leader of Essex County Council and Cabinet Member for Levelling up and the Economy, copied to Michael Gove MP Secretary of State for Levelling Up et al. expressing our opposition to the erosion of rural bus services and particularly those impacting on us. Such a loss affects the ability of those living in rural locations to access services in other towns. We understand that other bus routes to be withdrawn include the village link service that runs through Thaxted to Saffron Walden and Stansted Airport.

Stansted Airport Night Flights

The Parish Council have received notification of the intention of Manchester Airports Group's application to remove the Government restrictions on night flights which currently allow a maximum of 13,700 Stansted night flights a year. The PC will be objecting to this proposal. RECYCLING

Braintree District Council have asked if we could publish the following information:

The quality of recycling collected in the Braintree District continues to be very high, although there are still pockets of contamination with nappies, food, glass, and polystyrene as well as loose cardboard (which must be bagged along with the other recyclables to prevent it getting wet). In recent years, recycling companies have demanded higher quality Recyclate with little or no contaminants as this commands a greater resale value. Consequently, contaminants in the material we deliver to the reprocessor can result in whole vehicle loads being rejected, which is not only a waste of everyone's efforts to recycle, but is also bad for the environment. For these reasons, where contamination is evident, the crews will sticker and leave the sacks and the onus will be on the resident to remove the offending items and re-present the sacks on their next scheduled collection day.

CHANNEL SWEEP 2024/25


This is when it is hoped many of the cars will not be in the village in order for the equipment to sweep along the kerbs. The dates are:

he Society's AGM was held in the Town Hall on April 13th. Acting Chair Jonathan Davies welcomed everyone and highlighted some of the events of the past year. Links with Great Bardfield Primary School had been strengthened with the whole school making visits to the Museum, Cage and Bawden Room as part of their local history studies. There had been further groups from all over the country with a particular interest in the Bardfield Artists visiting the village. A successful Open Afternoon had been held to raise the profile of the Society. He thanked the Committee for their support and loyalty throughout the year. Particular thanks were given to Bill Gustar who was retiring as Treasurer after 28 years, Secretary Marilyn Edwards, and Claire Willetts who have left the Committee. Janet Dyson was thanked for her 20 years as Chair and Jenny Rooney for her continuing work as Archivist. George Wilder was welcomed as new Treasurer. Thanks were recorded to Doug Joyce and Neil and Lisa Churchman for their care of the Museum garden. Jonathan said that he would be standing down from the Committee. He emphasised that this had been a guiet but ultimately significant year for the Society with a rediscovery of what it can, with its broad historical focus, contribute to our village and beyond. Notice had been given for proposals for Chair and Vice Chair in advance of the meeting and Tim Regan was elected as Chair and Kate Lloyd as Vice Chair. Nigel Hill was welcomed onto the Committee. Remaining Committee members are Pat Coles, Janet Dyson, Norman Newton, Jenny Rooney, George Wilder.

After the AGM Ashley Cooper, farmer, writer, historian and environmentalist gave a lively and entertaining talk on 'Heroes and Villains of the Essex-Suffolk Border' which took the audience on a tour through history starting with the Romans and Boudicca, sweeping though the Peasants' Revolt, the Black Death and the Industrial Revolution, highlighting the part played by significant men and women on the way. His quick-fire questions kept the audience on their toes, testing their historical knowledge and rewarding correct answers with beautifully illustrated cards. The evening ended with delicious refreshments served by the Committee. Look out for announcements of further events.

From the Vicarage...

ne of the joys of second-hand books is that one finds, from time to time, a note which has been folded carefully and used, perhaps as a bookmark, perhaps as a reminder of who gave the book. Clergy particularly like passing on books to one another, and it's interesting sometimes to get some insight into where previous owners of a book ministered. Sometimes the writing is on the inside cover pages of the book itself – a mark of a particular occasion when it was given as a present. In any case, all these things give the book a story of its own, and one can feel the privilege of being part of a new chapter of that story.

Some particularly special books get treasured for a very long time. One of the oldest books I've had the privilege of seeing (but definitely not touching!) is the book of Gospels which is thought to have been brought to England by St Augustine in 597. A number of families have traditions of family Bibles where names of new generations are added as the years pass. In some of our churches, I have the experience of leading services from prayer books where prayers for the monarch have been adjusted from 'King' to 'Queen', which already puts a lower limit on their age. Perhaps as we read more and more on screens, we will learn in a new way the significance of having a physical printed book which can connect us with previous generations of readers.

Perhaps though, the most exciting thing about these connections to previous owners of books is the fact that there will often by many things we don't know about them. Our imaginations have some freedom to wonder about how they might have felt reading the book, compared to us. And when we let our imaginations loose on that question, we really start to get a feel for a whole community behind a book, much like the communities which have left their marks and their prayers on our churches. These are real communities, albeit separated by spans of time, and it is a delight and a privilege to recognise when we become a part of them too.

- Wisterias in the village are spectacular but do not feed as all members of that botanical family, Leguminosae, the pea family, produce their own nitrogen.
- Do spray your roses with Uncle Tom's organic, and next month comes an organic recipe to stem black spot. Interested? then order black soap in readiness.
- Making a hanging basket? No need to buy a coir liner It may be lined with grass turves, sacking or a cut up old jumper, must be an earthy colour.
- Dahlias can be planted in the garden about the middle of May, just in case we have a frost, unlikely but possible.
- Time to buy in colourful bedding plants and that's it till next month's recipe




Melmoth by Sarah Perry

Sarah Perry is an Essex born writer who is perhaps best known for her novel The Essex Serpent, set in the Victorian period with its conflicts between religion and growing scientific knowledge against the evocative landscape of the Blackwater Estuary. She followed this success with her third novel, Melmoth, a very different, much darker story, described as 'postmodern gothic'. Set during a freezing winter in Prague the author creates the perfect atmosphere for her recreation of the mythical Melmoth as a woman 'cursed to wander the earth without home or respite'. Often nothing more than a dark presence glimpsed out of the corner of the eye the grim figure Melmoth appears as a perpetual reminder of the most dark and painful occasions of human suffering. It's not an easy read but the group found it beautifully written and relevant in our own times when there is so much suffering in the world, of the need to bear witness.

Weyward by Emilia Hart

Another book that explores supernatural themes, Weyward deals with fear, superstition, persecution and the amazing strength of women. The book takes as its title the name that, in the medieval period,






women accused of witchcraft took as their own name for themselves. The author weaves together the stories of three resilient women connected across five centuries all of whom experience the transformative power of nature. The group reported a very positive response to this novel.

Blackwater by James Henry

Blackwater is a suggested book club read with a strong local connection. This traditional crime novel is set locally and the well plotted narrative unfolds against the background of the misty landscape of the Essex marshes and mudflats during a grim, snowy winter. The story takes place in the late 1980s when a newly formed team of detectives based in Colchester is confronted with a series of killings sparked off by the arrival of a shipment of drugs on the Essex coast. The author is very skilled at portraying period detail and police procedures at a time before computers, digital communications or CCTV. Crime fiction is, so I'm told, the most popular genre and



this book, by James Henry, the first in a series of detective novels set in Essex, is sure to capture the interest of local crime fans!

Nature Notes - Woodpeckers

here are three breeding species of woodpeckers native to this country the Green, the Greater Spotted, and the Lesser Spotted. I am very fortunate as I have two of them as visitors in my garden, both the Green Woodpecker and the Greater spotted. They are by no means residents they just pop in from time to time to check up and to see if I am okay and have a feed. The Greater spotted goes on the nut feeders eating peanuts whereas the Green is a ground feeder, feeding on ants, other small insects and vegetation. All woodpeckers are of course woodland species and I am very fortunate in so far as I have a strip of woodland just over the road about 75 yards from my kitchen

window. I find the names of the two spotted species very confusing (but it doesn't take much to confuse me these days!). The 'lesser' and 'greater' is a reference to the size of the bird but it seems to imply that it is a reference to the spots or flecks of white on the plumage. So let's put it straight the Greater spotted is the size of a thrush and the Lesser spotted is the size of a sparrow. The Greater spotted is all black on its back and the top side of its wings, but the Lesser spotted has lots of white specks on both wings and back. Both have crimson Greater Spotted Woodpecker vents and the males of



both have crimson naps or caps. I have never had the privilege of seeing a lesser spotted woodpecker in the flesh. The thing which prompted me to write about the wood peckers this month is the fact that I had three in my garden at the same time one morning this

week, two greater spotted females feeding on my nut feeders at the same, with a green one on the grass. The green one is very wary if I move a muscle it's off but the other two are quite brazen, almost tame until I reach for my phone. I think they are camera shy. One thing that amuses me about them is the way they use their strong thick tails as a perch when they are feeding. It is a well-documented wood pecker feature, they do it all the time. The tails of most birds are made up

of a few nice straight feathers which are used to steady the bird in flight and they can present guite a problem when damaged. But not so the wood peckers, they have a great wodge of feathers and they are used extensively as a means of sitting comfortably whilst working away excavating holes in dead trees or trees with dead boughs. They only excavate dead or decaying wood to feed on the insect and larvae that live in decaying wood. There is a well-documented case of a Vicar complaining that a wood pecker was damaging his church but when a joiner climbed up to look at the damaged woodwork he found it was riddled with death watch beetle and he was able to stop it from spreading, so the woodpecker did them a big favour. They also nest in holes that they have excavated the only nesting materials are small wood chips. Another interesting feature of woodpeckers is their mating call once heard never forgotten, best described as a series of rapid clicks. It is guite loud and it carries a long way. They find a loose flap of bark and bang it against the tree using their beaks at the same time having their voice box full of air which helps to create an echo effect.

The Blackwater & Pant Fluvial Audit & Restoration Plan

The Essex and Suffolk Rivers Trust (ESRT), with help from our partners, are running a large-scale project on the rivers Pant and Blackwater* in two parts. Firstly, a Fluvial Audit is being conducted over the spring and summer of 2024 with a final report being produced in the late Autumn. This report will then form the backbone of a strategy for this river system to be produced by the ESRT in early 2025.

Why the Blackwater & Pant?

In 2023, Essex County Council and the Essex River Hub identified the Blackwater as a priority catchment for the county for both restoration and for climate change action.

What areas are being covered?

The whole non-tidal length of the Blackwater & Pant will be assessed as part of the fluvial audit and will fall under the restoration plan. This covers an area of 24 parish councils from Sewards End to Langford as well as Braintree District Council and Witham Town Council.

Who will be involved?

The ESRT's main partners for this project are the Environment Agency and Essex and Suffolk Water with the fluvial audit conducted by JBA consulting. We hope to use this project as a method of bringing together groups and individuals from across the catchment including (but not limited to) the North Essex Farm Cluster's members, parish councils, private land owners & farmers, local environmental action groups, other NGOs and local businesses. During the fluvial audit, landowners will be contacted regarding land access for the survey.

What will the outcome of this be?

At present, environmental restoration projects across the catchment are opportunistic. The restoration plan produced from the fluvial audit will identify key target sites and issues for NGOs and the EA to work on. Larger scale projects will be more achievable with greater evidence of their worth and better coordination. This project is key to ensuring the long term environmental quality of the river.

The Pant and Blackwater are the same river. The upper section is the Pant and the lower portion is the Blackwater. The name changes under the Church Lane bridge at Bocking, on the outskirts of Braintree. No one is sure which name came first, with historic records contradicting each other including from the Romans and the historian Bede.

A Fluvial Audit is a type of large-scale river survey formed of two parts:

- A desk based study that looks at historic records of the river
- A hydrogeomorphological survey of the whole length of the river that captures a complete picture of the watercourse's current state

s day length increases and the air becomes warmer, plants put out new shoots. Many insects emerge and birds pair up, preparing to breed. Since the 1960's the average minimum winter temperatures have been rising. Snow fall is now a rarity, and frosty days are much less frequent. The current growing season is almost a month longer than 50 years ago. Primroses and bluebells are opening earlier. Researchers recorded that the first flowering of some 406 plant species has advanced by almost a month since 1986! This has a knock-on effect for the time of emergence of pollinating insects such as bees and butterflies; some are adapting to the warmer climate.

Hedgerow shrubs and trees are leafing and flowering earlier too, providing food for so many hungry caterpillars which are ideal food for nestlings. Hedgerows are a valuable wildlife habitat, often providing a living framework to the landscape and our rural heritage. Long-established hedges grow in soil that is rich in stored carbon and older trees within the hedgerow also hold large stores of carbon.

A recent planning application to fell an ancient hedgerow oak close to

Clavering led to a vigorous and successful campaign by residents to save it. This tree is now registered on the Ancient Tree Inventory, a record similar to the one for listed buildings. There are more trees in local hedgerows that could be recorded - details of how to do this can be found on https://ati.woodlandtrust.org.uk/how-to-record.

National Hedgerow Week organised by the Tree Council runs from 6th May
